Father Richard writes....

I speak to many of you quite frequently, so I am getting a picture of how you are all coping with these extraordinary circumstances. If I haven't yet spoken to you and you'd like a chat, do phone me on 01522 754752 – I won't always answer as I spend a huge amount of time in Zoom Meetings, but leave a name and number and I will get back to you. Serious or trivial, I'd love to hear.

I am really pleased that so many of you are getting to share in our services. As you will see below, lots of people are starting to feel confident to lead prayer and daily worship either intimately on Zoom, or rather more publicly on Facebook Live. We will find some more ways of sharing, using the website and let you know when they are available. Ducklings met online this week, and our Standing Committee are becoming old hands. The Pastoral Care Team met last week and once a few technical glitches were ironed out, had a great conversation. There's a healing service with Jane this Sunday. If you want to join a prayer group, join in the daily morning prayer, or just get together for a coffee on the internet, do let us know and we will help you to get going.

I am inclined to worry about the theology of things, especially when it comes to the Eucharist and the other sacraments. What we are doing is very strange – me in my dining room, dressed for a proper Eucharist, doing a short offering of the word and the sacrament. Loads of people watching, maybe saying some of the words at home, trying to feel some of what they might have felt in church. I particularly love it when you press the *Like* button during the service, and little hearts float up the screen I have in front of me – do keep it going. Do also *Like* the All Saints Nettleham group – it helps to promote it! We are getting many new, regular friends through this online worship and I am looking for ways to be more in touch. Maybe a Zoom coffee and a chat afterwards – we will see. Do send messages, especially afterwards, and share the service with friends.

The theological and social challenges come in things that are supposed to be physical. Being together. Sharing the peace – either with all of us who are signed in, or with me on the screen, or with each other at home if you are not alone. The sending out! Most of all in the receiving of the bread and wine, the absolute token of the presence of Jesus Christ with us according to his promises. It puts a huge burden on you to "pray him present", but it can be done. It is called 'spiritual communion'. Remember, you have to do it even when you receive the bread and the wine – what you do, pray, and believe, not just my words, make Christ's promise come true. I may normally say "Eat and drink in remembrance that he died for you", and that feels poignantly wrong in this separated world. But I also say the second half of the sentence, "and feed on him in your hearts by faith with thanksgiving". Until we meet again, we will have to do without the taste, the touch, the proximity and the physicality of the sacrament. However, for now we have the deeper part of the promise and our role in it to fulfil – faith and thanksgiving. In need of prayer....


Poem of the week

Malcolm Guite is being inspirational at the moment. Poet, priest, singer. He introduces his sonnet for St Mark's Day – yesterday if you are reading this on Sunday!

The 25th of April is the feast day of St. Mark the Evangelist, so I am posting again my sonnet on St. Mark's Gospel, one of a set of four sonnets on each of the four evangelists. As I re-read it during this lockdown, as we too make the shift 'from grand to intimate', I am struck afresh by the transition in Mark from Christ's action to his passion, from doing to suffering, from being in control to experiencing with us and for us what it is to depend, patiently, on the actions of others.

For each of these sonnets I have meditated on the traditional association of each of the evangelists with one of the 'four living creatures' round the throne, and how that helps us to focus on the particular gifts and emphasis of that Gospel writer. Mark is the lion. There is a power, a dynamic a swiftness of pace in Mark's Gospel, his favourite word is 'immediately'! and that suits the lion. His Gospel starts in the wilderness and that suits it too.

But the great paradox in Mark is that the Gospel writer who shows us Christ at his most decisive, powerful, startling and leonine is also the one who shows us how our conquering lion, our true Aslan, deliberately entered into suffering and passion, the great 'doer' letting things be done unto him. In this sonnet, I am especially indebted to WH Vanstone's brilliant reading of this aspect of Mark in his wonderful book *The Stature of Waiting*.

A wingèd lion, swift, immediate Mark is the gospel of the sudden shift From first to last, from grand to intimate, From strength to weakness, and from debt to gift, From a wide desert's haunted emptiness To a close city's fervid atmosphere, From a voice crying in the wilderness To angels in an empty sepulchre.

And Christ makes the most sudden shift of all; From swift action as a strong Messiah Casting the very demons back to hell To slow pain, and death as a pariah. We see our Saviour's life and death unmade And flee his tomb dumbfounded and afraid.

Spírítual opportunity in lockdown.... Some ideas from English Jesuits.

During this time of social distancing and 'lock down' many people have been finding creative ways of using their time. The Jesuit ministry to young adults in London have been experimenting with individually directed retreats. So far we have tried two different formats, the first was where a member of our young adult community in Brixton went into silence for a week (despite sharing the house with two other people) and spent the week in prayer, reflection and even more distancing from friends and family. Each day she 'zoomed in' for an online video call with her retreat director who listened to her experiences and between them they worked out where she might focus for the next 24 hours. 'I wrapped up my week feeling rejuvenated and more clear on plans for the next phase of my life,' the retreatant wrote afterwards.

The second experiment was to offer a retreat in daily life through Holy Week. This time the dozen retreatants were not in silence but going about their daily lives – such as they are at this time, working online, sharing coffee breaks, meals and glasses of wine virtually etc. The retreatants committed to 30 to 60 minutes prayer and a meeting with their retreat guide each day. There were also a couple of prayer workshops, again through the Zoom platform. This was a delightful experience of praying together in front of our screens. The retreat began and ended with a group meeting on Zoom, adding a community dimension to what was otherwise an individually directed retreat.

The venerable Justine's reflections....

The Archdeacon of Boston, The Venerable Justine Allain Chapman, is putting out a wonderful series of reflections on our spiritual life during the lockdown. She is wise, witty and whimsical, even wacky! Do look for all her stuff. She is doing it alphabetically and has just now reached T.

Resilience A to Z. T is for Tortoise.

I'm someone who has usually done quite a lot before breakfast - the washing will be in the machine or on the line, the dishwasher unpacked. This habit comes, in part, from years of needing to get children up and out before I could start work. Now that spring is here, the tortoise, out of hibernation, needs to be fed and watered every morning. This pet, you understand, isn't mine. The child the tortoise belongs to is not yet in a position to accommodate it. I was told this would happen by others wiser than me and I heeded the advice, agreeing to a low maintenance tortoise.

And Nettle, for that is her name, shows me every morning that even before nibbling that yellow flower, she needs to be in the sunshine. No basking at first, just being there cold and still. After the night, Nettle, having been out of the sunlight, can do nothing. She may be low maintenance but being in the sun is essential and has to come first. After that she races around, really (remember that tortoise and hare fable?), eats, basks, sleeps.

Nettle reminds me, that it is not doing things before breakfast that is the issue, it is doing anything at all if I haven't placed myself in the light and presence of God, not just to acknowledge my creatureliness before the creator, but to be warmed and energised. It need only be a pause, a glance, a sentence - spoken or sung. Then I act out of the gift of life, connected to God, not deluded that I can live self sufficiently. Jesus described himself as the vine and his disciples as the branches (John 15:5). Abide, is what he asks of his followers, abide in him, in his presence because apart from the vine the branches cannot live, cannot be fruitful. They wither and die, or because they are useless, get lopped off.

Prayer, being in the presence of God has been expanding for me. I have noticed the life around me, needed to put myself in the presence of beauty, stillness and colour, have fewer words. Join Nettle in just being in the light, before doing anything else.
